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Seasonal Prohibition on the Possession of Blackfin, Vermilion, Black, and Silk Snapper in Caribbean Federal Waters Begins at 12:01 a.m., Local Time, October 1, 2013

NOAA Fisheries reminds commercial and recreational fishers that from October 1 through December 31, each year, no person may fish for or possess vermilion, black, blackfin, or silk snapper in or from the U. S. Caribbean federal waters.

The seasonal prohibition on commercial and recreational fishing for blackfin, vermilion, black, and silk snapper begins at 12:01 a.m., local time, on October 1 and extends through December 31, each year. The U.S. Caribbean federal waters consist of those waters extending from the nine nautical mile seaward boundary of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the three nautical mile seaward boundary of the territory of the U.S. Virgin Islands out to 200 nautical miles offshore.

This action complies with regulations implemented under Amendment 3 to the Fishery Management Plan for the Reef Fish Fishery of Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands to address required provisions of the MagnusonStevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, and is necessary to protect these resources. The Caribbean Fishery Management Council, in cooperation with NOAA Fisheries, developed the amendment to regulate fishing mortality.

This bulletin provides only a summary of the information regarding the existing regulations. Any discrepancies between this bulletin and the regulations as published in the *Federal Register* will be resolved in favor of the *Federal Register*.

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
